Forest School



"Worm, Worm!" is what we hear shouting from the log circle.

"Ugh! Where? Can I see it? It is moving!" It seems such a small moment. But there is so much more to it. When outside (and not only when outside), children have the ability to step into the amazing world of wonder. They are in the moment and they see the tiniest things and get joy from it. Questions may arise for them. In Forest School we are in the world of extremes. Huge trees and tiny little creatures like green flies, woodlice and red spiders. There is sunshine and rain, excitement and there might also be boredom (how healthy is that!).

"Forest School is an inspirational process that offers ALL learners regular opportunities to achieve and develop confidence and self-esteem through hands-on learning experiences in a woodland or natural environment with trees." (Irish Forest School Association)

What is Forest School for me personally?

I understand Forest School not as a way of teaching the children something directly (even if that happens, too), but to make them curious about the outdoors. Posing questions rather than giving them the answers. Planning activities, but being open to their suggestions and ideas, because at that moment they might be interested in something else or something more important is going on. In Forest School learning often happens unseen.

There are many magical moments during our sessions and I want to share a few...

- When the children told their stories. We chatted about birds and they came up with fantastic anecdotes and facts.
- When they "just" play and thread their stories into and around it.
- Growing resilience (e.g. because your best friend is not there and you need to handle this new situation "on your own", but what a chance!)
- When we sit together in a circle and listen silently (and maybe with eyes closed) to the sounds around us. These moments of silence are pure magic!
- When they get dirty and enjoy that.

- When they light their first fairy fire.
- Their glowing faces while sawing.
- To see that they learn with all their senses and are ready to take risks
- To realise that the creative process is much more important to them than the result.
- When they take ownership. Once, a group came and asked me to sit in a circle because they really wanted to discuss something with their friends that did not go well that day. When we sat down, it was their circle, not mine.

Thanks to all the children whom I can grow with. A huge thanks to Rosemarie for her ongoing support and to the amazing teachers who tap into this different way of teaching and stepping back without a moment of hesitation. Thanks to the parents for their trust and acceptance of their children coming back home with bags full of dirty clothes, sticks and other forest treasures.

From the Board of Management

On behalf of the Board of Management, I am delighted to share our annual Summer Newsletter and reflect on the past year now that holidays are rapidly approaching.

I would like to say a particular thank you to the staff who have worked so hard to return the school to its usual vibrant self after a couple of very difficult years. In my role as Chair I have come to learn how RMDS staff deeply collaborate and share ideas and skills to ensure the children have the best and broadest possible learning experience. This collaboration and open communication is led by our Principal, Rosemarie and Deputy Principal, Paul. Our staff are our most valuable resource and we are very grateful to have them

As a Board we have been busy with general management of the school including overseeing maintenance of the building, ensuring compliance with Department of Education policies, ensuring the school has sufficient funds to operate and deciding how to most efficiently allocate the resources we have in the best interests of all the children.

Focus on Wellbeing

Our overriding priority as a Board for this year was the wellbeing of all the children following the disruption of lockdown. Many in the school community have found themselves negatively impacted in the aftermath of the pandemic in different ways and we are still discovering the impact it has had on the children. There has been a focus on physical activity and sport for all and the establishment of a Wellbeing Committee and a Wellbeing Week. Most recently a number of parents very generously shared their creative skills during Creative Week which the children loved. The school will be issuing a survey to children, parents and staff regarding the impact of the Covid pandemic. As a Board we will continue to be mindful of any additional needs the children may have as they move into the next academic year.

Voluntary Contributions and Fund-Raising Activities

One of the Board's main concerns every year is ensuring we have sufficient funds to run the school. We appreciate the financial pressures faced by everyone at the moment and would like to thank you for your generous contributions and all your hard work and effort in raising funds to support our school.

People are always surprised to discover that less than 50% of funds needed by the school are received from the Department of Education. The remaining funds are received through voluntary contributions and fundraising activities by the Parents Association. This leaves the Board in the unavoidable position of having to ask parents every year to contribute. Of course these contributions are voluntary and we ask only those who are in a position to contribute to do so. A drop in contributions puts not just wider educational opportunities such as swimming lessons and forest school in jeopardy but essential items such as routine building maintenance.

To date we have raised 49% of our annual target of €35,000. The Board has prepared a separate information sheet to answer all your questions on voluntary contributions. Please take the time to look at this.

Joint Committee

Representatives from the Board, the Parents' Association and the Patron meet every term in order to understand the most urgent needs of the school community and plan accordingly. The Board is a huge supporter of the activities of the Parents' Association and is very grateful for the huge amount of work they do. This not only raises essential funds but creates a real sense of a school community and friendship. I would like to make a special note of thank you to Lorraine Hackett and Grainne Fahy as Co-Chairs of the PA for their seemingly endless energy and commitment. Please support the Parents' Association in any way you can.

Our school is quite unique in having a parent-controlled patron body to oversee the ethos of the school and ownership of our building. We are very grateful to Stephen O'Herlihy (Chairperson of the Exec), David Clerkin (Treasurer of the Exec) and the Executive Committee as a whole for undergoing that role.

Thanks to Caroline and her team in Childcare who continue to provide an invaluable and highly regarded local afterschool service. The children vote with their feet and spaces always book out quickly!
